



LUNCHTIME SUPERVISOR JOB DESCRIPTION

Lunchtime supervisors play an important part in the school day. They are a valued part of the school community. They have three main roles:

- 1. To supervise the children whilst they eat.
- 2. To promote an active and safe play time.
- 3. To be responsible for the safeguarding and wellbeing of children by following school policy relating to safeguarding, health and safety and behaviour management.

Personal Hygiene:

- All children will be sent to the toilets or sink in the classroom prior to lunch by the class teacher to wash their hands.
- Children are also encouraged to wash their hands when they put their lunch box back

Timing:

- Supervisors are expected to be either in the lunch hall, or outside on the playground where they supervise from 12.15pm
- The children are inside for approximately 30 minutes to eat their lunch after which tables and floors are wiped and cleaned.
- The bell is rung at 1.15pm and staff collect their class from the playground.

Behaviour during lunch times:

Whilst eating -

Our children are expected to -

- Sit at their tables in the hall
- Be polite
- Eat lunch using good manners
- Talk quietly to their peers

Lunchtime supervisors are expected to -

- Encourage good manners
- Encourage children to eat their food
- Help children open packaging, drinks etc.
- Help children to develop self-help skills

After eating

Our children are expected to -

• Wait quietly until they are told they can pack away by an adult

Lunch time supervisors are expected to -

• Clean the tables and floor and monitor what the children are eating

Whilst on the playground/playing field:

Our children are expected to -

- Treat others as they wish to be treated
- Show care, kindness and consideration to others
- Respect other people's property and views
- Enjoy playing games co-operatively
- Ask permission to go back into school for any reason
- Speak to the supervisors about any issues that arise that they feel need help with

In addition the children in Years 4 and 5 have received positive play training and are expected to:

- Take on the role as a `buddy' (Yr 4) and 'Sports Crew' (Yr 5)
- Take an active part in organising and playing games with the younger children.

Whilst on duty lunchtime supervisors are expected to:

- Help children play co-operatively
- Promote positive play through modelling expectation
- Make lunchtimes an enjoyable experience
- Promote good behaviour
- Promote the safety and well-being of each child
- Encourage children to resolve their differences by talking through the situation and helping children to reach their own solutions.
- Send for a member of the teaching staff if a serious incident occurs.

Achieving good behaviour:

The following strategies have been agreed as being helpful for lunchtime supervisors –

- Praise the children for things they do well
- Point out unacceptable behaviour without criticising the individual
- Be fair and consistent
- Show the children that you care
- Be friendly and approachable
- Encourage and play games with the children
- Always use positive language strategies.

Wet playtime:

The children are expected to -

- Remain in their classrooms during wet playtime
- Be involved in activities that are agreed by their class teacher

First Aid Procedure:

- The child is to be brought into school with an adult
- First Aid is to be administered by a First Aider all support staff are trained
- The incident will be recorded in the accident book
- Head bumps/injuries will be reported to the child's teacher and a bumped head letter will be sent home with the child which has been signed by the headteacher
- If an incident is deemed to be serious then the headteacher or in her absent a member
 of the senior leadership team will be spoken to and decide on whether parents will be
 contacted.

Sun Safety:

- Encourage children to play in shaded areas
- Children are encouraged to wear hats, sun cream and glasses
- Children are allowed to take out water bottles on particularly hot days

Fire Procedure:

• On the alarm sounding children are expected to line up in classes on set places on the playground.
